NATIONAL TASK TEAM ON GENDER AND SEXUAL ORIENTATION-BASED VIOLENCE PERPETRATED ON LGBTI PERSONS

BACKGROUND

In March 2011, the Minister of Justice and Constitutional Development mandated the establishment of a National Task Team (NTT) to develop a National Intervention Strategy that will address corrective rape. The Department initiated engagements with key Government Departments and Institutions to develop the National Task Team. The NTT is constituted by Government Departments, chapter nine institutions and Civil Society Organisations that specialise in issues related to LGBTI persons and communities.

The Bill of Rights, enshrined in South Africa 1996 Constitution, includes a guarantee of equality and a prohibition on discrimination on many grounds, including gender, sex and sexual orientation. The work of the NTT is guided by the Constitution which guarantees equality and prohibits discrimination on many grounds.

The purpose of the NTT is to develop a National Intervention Strategy to address Gender- and Sexual orientation-based violence against LGBTI persons, especially in the criminal justice system. Part of the work of the NTT involves urgently finalizing a rapid response mechanism that will identify and track cases involving crimes committed against LGBTI persons. The NTT's immediate priority is to address addresses violence against LGBTI people.


The NTT will, at the end of its work, be expected to produce two main outputs: (1) An approved National Intervention Strategy to end Gender- and Sexual orientation-based crimes perpetrated against the LGBTI persons, (2) an approved Inter-sectoral Implementation Plan for the Intervention Strategy to align parallel and complementary programmes in government and civic society.

COMPOSITION OF THE NATIONAL INTERVENTION TASK TEAM

The NTT is constituted by Government Departments and Institutions that participate in crime intervention, including Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) that specialise in issues related to LGBTI persons and communities:

Department of Justice and Constitutional Development; National Prosecuting Authority of South Africa; Legal Aid South Africa; Department of Social Development; South African Police Service; Department of Health; Department of Basic Education; Department of Correctional Services; Government Communications and Information Systems; Department of Women, Children and Persons with Disabilities; South African Human Rights Commission; South African Commission for Gender Equality; Human Rights Watch (HRW); Treatment Action Campaign (TAC); Gay & Lesbian Memory in Action (GALA); OUT LGBT Well-Being (OUT); Forum for the Empowerment of Women (FEW); SANAC LGBTI Sector; Triangle Project (TP); Luleki Sizwe (LS); Gender DynamiX (GDX); Intersex South Africa; Life Line; and the Foundation for Human Rights (FHR).

THE NTT IS LED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE & CONSTITUTIONAL DEVELOPMENT. THE GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE IS ILLUSTRATED BELOW:



COMMUNICATION PROTOCOL

Communication Lead

- The Minister of Justice and Constitutional Development (DoJ&CD) will lead all communication on behalf of the National Task Team.
- The Minister of Justice will be supported by the Deputy Minister, Director General and designated spokespersons in this role.

Departments and CSOs

- No individual department or Civil Society Organisation (CSO) that forms part of the NTT shall communicate on behalf of the NTT.
- Departments and CSOs retain their right to speak to or on behalf of their constituencies about the work of the NTT (but shall not speak on behalf of the NTT).

COMMUNICATION OBJECTIVES

- To create public awareness of the work of the National Task Team across all sectors of South African society.
- To educate the South African society on Constitutional Rights and encourage public tolerance/ acceptance towards LGBTI persons
- To highlight various inter-sectoral programmes to fight crimes against LGBTIs as well as those programmes that support victims.
- To educate officials within the Criminal Justice System value chain about the service needs of LGBTI persons.
- To build and maintain partnerships with all sectors of society (NGOs, FBOs, CBOs) in a coordinated response to combat violence against LGBTI persons.
- To demonstrate that leaders of various sectors of South African society care about the plight of LGBTI persons.

COMMUNICATION ENVIRONMENT

- According to a survey conducted by the Human Sciences Research Council in 2007, more than 80% of the South African population considered homosexuality as 'always wrong'.
- Discrimination and harassment of LGBTI persons happens in all sectors of South African society. It is however, incidents of violence are most prevalent in rural areas and urban townships amongst working class and poor black people. The situation is compounded by limited access to protection of the criminal justice system and/or redress through civil law remedies.
- Civil Society believes that Government is not doing or saying enough to address the plight of LGBTI community. A report, titled More Than A Name: State-Sponsored Homophobia And Its Consequences In Southern Africa, that documents harassment and violence against sexual minorities in southern Africa was released in Cape Town in May. The report said that while South Africa prohibited discrimination based on sexual orientation in its constitution, it concluded that the equality guaranteed to lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people was fragile, and even endangered by the "silence and foot-dragging of political leaders" in the country.
- As a country, we are the proud signatories of many international protocols that promote a human rights culture based on freedom and equality. The Universal Declaration of Human Rights (1948); the Convention on the Elimination of all forms of Discrimination Against Women (1981); the Protocol to the African Charter on Human and People's Rights and the Rights of Women in Africa (2003); and the Southern African Development Community Protocol on Gender and Development (2008) still remain the key guiding principles for the promotion of human rights and for intervention against genderbased violence.

COMMUNICATION CHALLENGES

- Changing the mind-set of opinion makers within South African society and co-opt them into campaign advocates:
 - The efficacy of the communication campaign will benefit immensely from obtaining buy in of thought leaders within South African society i.e. traditional leadership structure, church leadership & political leadership

- Integration of communication efforts across all spheres of government and alignment with civil society partners:
 - In order to ensure consistency in messaging, coordinating structures must interact to ensure that messages are aligned and formulated in a way that they will resonate nationally.
 - Consistent branding by all partners will enhance the public's ability to identify the campaign and overall effectiveness.
- Internal awareness: to educate public servants on their responsibility to serve all victims of crime equally and in line with batho pele principles
 - Breaking any stereotypes amongst public servants is crucial to strengthening governments' ability to respond to LGBTI needs.
- Educating South Africans on the criminality of their actions based on the South African Constitution
 - The Constitutional prescripts protecting the rights of LGBTIs will remain aspirational, without South Africans feeling a responsibility to abide by them.
- Fostering partnership with the media in creating awareness of the work of the NTT.
 - In line with the media role of informing and educating society, it is necessary to bring the various media houses on board as partners to the NTT efforts to raise awareness and educate South Africans about the rights of LGBTI persons.

COMMUNICATION MESSAGES AND THEMES

DRAFT KEY MESSAGES

BRIEF:

The killing of Duduzile Zozo from Thokoza in July 2013 has again shined a spotlight on the safety of the gay and lesbian community in the country. While the case is being investigated by police, it is suspected that she was a victim of corrective rape (referred to as 'corrective rape') and later murdered. Corrective rape is defined as a hate crime in which men rape lesbian women in order to "cure them" of being lesbian.

These incidents of violence against gays and lesbians are most prevalent in rural areas and urban townships amongst working class and poor black people. Media have recently reported on the rising number of gay killings in the country especially in Gauteng and Northern Cape.

In response to the hate crimes committed against black lesbians, the Minister of Justice and Constitutional Development in 2011 established a National Task Team to develop a National Strategy to address these issues. This Task Team comprises Government Departments, chapter nine institutions and Civil Society Organisations that specialise in issues relating to lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and intersex (LGBTI) persons and communities.

It has since developed the terms of reference and extended the scope of the project to include all genderbased violent crimes and sexual orientation-based crimes that are perpetrated against LGBTI persons.


