- The State of the Nation Address is one of the most important events on South Africa's parliamentary and national calendar?
- The State of the Nation Address is also commonly known as the "Opening of Parliament".
- During an elections year, two State of the Nation Addresses are delivered;
 One, before the final session of the outgoing Parliament, and the other, after the elections when the new Parliament has been formed.
- 4. Parliament is located in Cape Town.
- 5. The State of the Nation Address takes place at a Joint Sitting of Parliament's two houses, the National Assembly and the National Council of Provinces.
- It is one of the rare occasions when the three arms of State, the Executive, the Judiciary and the Legislature come together for an occasion.
- 7. During the speech, the President talks about the government's achievements of the past year and its programme for the coming year.
- 8. As part of the ceremony, Civil Guards of Honour are lined along the red carpet to welcome the President.
- 9. Members of the public, representing each of the Provinces, are selected to participate in the Civil Guard of Honour.

- 10. Learners are selected to participate in the Junior Guard of Honour.
- 11. The Address by the President is debated by the two Houses of Parliament after the State of the Nation Address.
- 12. The political parties have an opportunity to state their opinions and raise questions after the President's Address.
- 13. The President has an opportunity to respond to matters arising from the debate on his opening address.
- 14. The State of the Nation Address is broadcast live on television and radio to encourage public involvement.
- Certain ceremonial traditions take place including a mounted police escort and a military escort.
- 16. Before the President enters the National Assembly Chamber to deliver his address, he takes the national salute on a podium Outside the National Assembly building.
- 17. A flypast by the South African Air Force and a 21-gun salute takes place while the President takes the salute.
