- 2. All indigenous biological resource used by the Trust are sourced from registered nurseries and cultivated in Edakeni. No material will be collected from the wild to produce any products
- 3. The above indigenous biological resources will be cultivated, processed using specific formulations and packaged for commercial distribution.
- 4. All formulas used by the Trust to develop products have been created by the late Isaac Banda, an *inyanga* and economic development consultant who initiated the project. No indigenous knowledge of the community was used in the project. The formulations of the products are kept as trade secrets by the Edakeni Muthi Futhi Trust.
- 5. The Edakeni community owns 35 percent of shares in the project. The Benefit Sharing Agreement has been signed with the community in order to comply with BABS Regulations.
- 6. The Benefit Sharing Agreement will be reviewed every five years.
