


#10 SAFETY TIP | FLOODING

Teach your children about the dangers of floods.







#9 SAFETY TIP | FLOODING

Do not try to drive over a **low-water bridge** if water is flowing strongly across it and the **ground is not visible**.

Keep your important documents in a water-resistant container.

#4 SAFETY TIP | FLOODING

Never try to walk, swim or drive in swift-flowing water. Even if water is 15 cm deep, it can sweep you off your feet







#6 SAFETY TIP | FLOODING

Drive to and park at safer areas.







#1 SAFETY TIP | FLOODING

Living in a low-lying area?

Take special care during storms, as sudden floods might affect them. Monitor the rising water levels and evacuate to a safer place or higher spot when the water level rises.







#15) SAFETY TIP | FLOODING

If you are **on foot,**be aware that **low-moving water** can be dangerous
during flood conditions,
do not walk into it.







#16 SAFETY TIP | FLOODING

Avoid Contact with flood waters

It may be **contaminated** with raw sewage, oil or other dangerous substances, and may also be charged with electricity from fallen powerlines.








#14) SAFETY TIP | FLOODING

Do not **camp** or **park** your car along rivers or washes, especially during heavy rains or thunderstorms.







#13 SAFETY TIP | FLOODING

Be especially vigilant at **night**. It is harder to recognise potentially deadly road **hazards**.

Keep your **cell phone** in close proximity to you and have emergency numbers at hand.
